Social Prescribing

Many things that affect our health cannot be treated by doctors or medicine alone, like loneliness, isolation or stress due to problems with debt or housing. Social prescribing connects people to non-medical support to address these issues and other unmet needs. This could involve making an appointment to see one of the volunteers at Parkbury House. We can help some-one who is isolated to join a befriending group, an art class or a community gardening project, based on what matters to them. Connecting someone struggling with financial stress to a service that helps with managing debt or claiming benefits. Working with someone with high blood pressure to take up a form of exercise that they're comfortable with. Social prescribing involves understanding the complexities of people's lives and the inequalities they may face. It can help change the circumstances that make people unwell, and empower people to manage existing health problems. It can help people to connect and to grow in confidence. Our trained and experienced team of social prescribers are available every Wednesday.

Appointments can be booked at Parkbury House through reception. Appointments (45 minutes long) are every Wednesday from 09.30 -12.30

Reception & Administrative Team

Our reception and administrative team play a crucial role in ensuring the smooth operation of the Parkbury House surgery, working tirelessly behind the scenes to keep things running efficiently for patients. From managing appointment bookings and processing referrals to handling patient inquiries and coordinating with clinical staff, their attention to detail and dedication helps ensure that patients receive timely care. They also work on important administrative tasks, such as updating patient records, liaising with external healthcare providers, and maintaining confidentiality, all while providing a friendly and helpful first point of contact for everyone who walks through the door. Resuscitation Course

Every year the clinical team at Parkbury House needs to update their knowledge and skills about basic life support. Until recently this training was outsourced, but now it is provided in-house by GP partner Dr Jonathan Freedman and Physician's Associate Zara Allardyce. Here are some the recent course attendees honing their skills in the surgery meeting room:



Whilst this is a mandatory requirement for doctors and nurses, resuscitation training can be undertaken by anyone and everyone. St John's Ambulance offers free online learning modules that anyone can sign up to. There are also several very useful resus apps for mobile phones. We recommend iResus to our delegates. Also remember that there are many defibrillators in varying locations locally and if you need to access one you will be told the location by the 999 operator, and they will also talk you through how to use it. Please remember, it is impossible to do any harm to a person who has suffered a cardiac arrest.

My enduring memory (and my husband and I will be forever grateful), was of Bruce answering an emergency call in the early hours of a Sunday morning, I had had a few episodes of severe stomach pain and previous doctors had put it down to bugs/ viruses. Bruce sat on a stool in our bedroom, nodding off occasionally as he waited to see how my symptoms progressed. After an hour or so he diagnosed acute appendicitis and called an ambulance. I recall him saying that some of his colleagues didn't think there was such a thing as a 'grumbling appendix' but he believed otherwise!
